Dennis H. Novack, MD, is Professor of Medicine and Associate Dean of Medical Education at Drexel University College of Medicine, where he directs clinical skills teaching and assessment. With colleagues at Drexel, he developed a longitudinal program of professionalism teaching, assessment and remediation that recently won the Edward D. Harris Professionalism Award. He is Chief Editor of DocCom and ProfessionalFormation.org, online resources in healthcare education. His rock-and-roll band with medical students, the Dennis Novack Experience, has played at every Drexel Pediatric AIDS Benefit Concert for the last 25 years.

Preston Reynolds, MD, PhD, Professor of Medicine and Nursing at the University of Virginia, began working in the field of professionalism at its formation 30 years ago. She spearheaded a national movement to align professionalism objectives in education, licensing, and accreditation in the U.S. and was recognized for this work with Mastership in the American College of Physicians. A professional historian interested in the impact of race on health professions education and health care delivery, she is weaving this history with implicit-bias training as a way of conceptualizing race-conscious professionalism to promote diversity and inclusion. She enjoys dancing, sailing, and cooking for others.

Scott Wright, MD, is Professor of Medicine at Johns Hopkins; Director of the Division of General Internal Medicine at Johns Hopkins Bayview Medical Center; and the Director of the Miller Coulson Academy of Clinical Excellence, an institution-wide initiative aimed at promoting and recognizing excellence in patient care. He recently launched CLOSLER.org to learn from exceptional role models about caring for patients. Scott and his wife enjoy being outside with their dog and watching their 3 children playing.

Rachel Levine, MD, is Associate Professor of Medicine and Associate Dean for Faculty Educational Development, Office of Faculty Development, Johns Hopkins School of Medicine. Dr. Cymet is Chief of Clinical Education at the American Association of Osteopathic Medicine and Urgent Care Physician at the University of Maryland School of Medicine. A graduate of Nova Southeastern

College of Osteopathic Medicine, he completed an internal medicine residency at Yale University School of Medicine. He then accepted at a position at the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine and while there, earned a Masters of Education in Health Professions. Dr. Cymet has long been interested in clinical education, and his research investigating mental health and medical students led him to develop a national program on cultivating resilience for healthcare professionals.

Dr. Cymet will discuss what we know about ourselves and how we can use that knowledge to stay healthy. He will consider where health professionals need help and what kind of help they need. Finally, he will look at these issues starting from osteopathic medical students and extending into practice.

Steven Rosenzweig, MDResilience, Felt Experience and Practice

Steven Rosenzweig, MD, is Clinical Associate Professor of Emergency Medicine at Drexel University College of Medicine and Director of the Program in Professionalism, Bioethics and Humanities in the Office of Educational Affairs. He is

board certified in Emergency Medicine and Hospice and Palliative Medicine (HPM) and maintains an outpatient practice in HPM. At Drexel, Dr. Rosenzweig directs professionalism education and remediation and curricula in bioethics and social medicine. He has a career interest in mindfulness and other self-regulation skills: he completed the Teachers Development Intensive in Mindfulness Based Stress Reduction in 2005 and certified through the Academy for Guided Imagery in 2007. He has published on the health effects of mindfulness and routinely teaches self-regulation practices to medical students, residents and patients.

This talk will reexamine constructs of burnout and resilience, employing a means of knowing ourselves and the world: sometimes called felt experience, sometimes called embodied awareness. We'll use brief, contemplative inquiries into aliveness, value and connectedness.



Moral Resilience: Preserving Integrity in the Midst of Complexity

Dr. Rushton is the Anne and George L. Bunting Professor of Clinical Ethics in the Johns Hopkins Berman Institute of Bioethics and the School of Nursing and co-chair of the Johns Hopkins Hospital's Ethics Committee and Consultation

Service. Her current scholarship in clinical ethics focuses on moral distress and suffering of clinicians and the development of moral resilience, particularly in novice nurses. Dr. Rushton is interested in developing innovative methods to cultivate moral resilience and designing a healthcare culture that supports ethical practice.

In her Keynote Address, Dr. Rushton will discuss how moral adversity abounds in clinical practice. Clinicians confront situations that regularly challenge their integrity, values, and well being. Moral resilience, the ability to preserve or restore integrity in response to moral adversity, offers clinicians the skills and practices that support them in the midst of clinical complexity.

Albert Wu, MD, MPH
Institutional Resilience and Supporting the Second Victim

Albert Wu is the Director of the Center for Health Services and Outcomes Research and Professor of Health Policy and Management at the Johns Hopkins School of Public Health. His research and teaching focus on both patient outcomes and

quality of care. He was the first to measure the impact of antiretroviral therapy on quality of life in HIV clinical trials. For more than 30 years, Dr. Wu has been studying how medical errors are handled and particularly what the psychological impact is of medical errors on both patients and caregivers, whom he termed the "second victim" in a 2000 British Medical Journal article.

In his Keynote Address, Dr. Wu will discuss how health care is a highly stressful work environment, and how staff members can be traumatized by unanticipated bad outcomes for patients, as well as other stressful patient-related events. Recognizing this, Johns Hopkins Hospital launched RISE (Resilience In Stressful Events), a volunteer-based, peer-support program to provide timely support to health care workers in need. RISE helps individual workers and also helps to improve the resilience of the entire system, allowing it to provide high quality care.

ACGME Focus on Physician Well-Being: Deepening Our
Faculty, Residents, and Patients
